EDITORIAL

On October 10, 2021, Pope Francis invited the universal Church to embark on a journey towards a Synodal Church focused on 'Communion, Participation, and Mission'. The commonly known 'Synod on Synodality' commenced with a solemn Mass at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome, where Pope Francis encouraged the Church to embrace a 'culture of encounter' and urged the faithful 'not to soundproof our hearts and remain barricaded in our certainties'.

The word 'synod' has its roots in the Greek words 'with' and 'path,' signifying a sense of 'journeying together'. The Synodal journey encompassed various levels of the Church, including the local, diocesan, national, and continental levels. Through deliberations and discussions, a working document titled 'Instrumentum Laboris' was produced, which was subsequently released on June 20th, 2023.

The working document functions as a guiding document for the upcoming General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops. It is the outcome of consultations with the faithful and clergy regarding the pastoral and existential challenges confronted by the Church. This document serves as a path for discernment, outlining the necessary steps for the Church to advance and 'flourish as a synodal community'.

Instrumentum Laboris is composed of an explanatory text and fifteen worksheets that reveal a dynamic vision of the concept of 'synodality.' There are specifically two main sections:


In **Section A**, the focus is on reflecting on the past two years' experience and outlining a path towards further development as a synodal Church.

A. For a synodal Church. An integral experience

- 1. The characteristic signs of a synodal Church
- 2. A way forward for the synodal Church: conversation in the Spirit



Section B, entitled 'Communion, Mission, Participation' focuses on the 'three priority issues' at the heart of the work to be done in October 2023.





- **2. Co-responsibility in Mission:** How can we better share gifts and tasks in the service of the Gospel?
- **3. Participation, governance and authority:** What processes, structures and institutions in a missionary synodal Church?



The document emphasizes that a synodal Church prioritizes active listening and acknowledges the need for humility, recognizing its need to seek forgiveness and its ongoing learning process. By being a Listening Church, it invites introspection and a thorough examination of conscience, guided by the Holy Spirit. This journey of repentance and conversion aims to continually renew the Church, while also fostering pathways of reconciliation, healing, and justice.





Against the backdrop of this significant event, our Parish has initiated a Parish Pastoral Plan, commencing with a comprehensive training program. At the local level, we, as a Parish, strive to embody a listening Church, attuned to the concerns and challenges faced by our community. Our aim is to ensure that every individual within our Parish feels included and valued. With hope and confidence, we embark on this new academic year accompanied by a newly formed Parish Pastoral Council. We aspire for everyone in our Parish to experience a sense of belonging and feel the Church's love, while knowing that the Church is always open to listen and engage in dialogue with all individuals in God's diverse creation.



NEW ZONES

am sure many of you are wondering why are we re-organising the Parish and what are these new Zone. The reason for the reorganisation of the Parish is that over a period of time, as many people moved from Dockyard, the number of families in each of the zones dramatically decreased. Thus, the need to re-structure the parish to make sure there is a more equitable distribution of Parishioners.


The early 9 zones are now reduced to six zones and each zone now has around 60 to 80 families. The Parish is divided with P D'Mello road being the center line of division marking the East and West. Two of our Zones are on the east of the road and four zones are on the west of the Road. Each zone is further divided into three clusters and each of these clusters have one person representing them in the Parish Council.

Zone 1 comprises the area from Nasir Palace/ Khan Building to D'lima Street end. They are represented by Shevron Furtado, Maria Coutinho, and Ben Carvalho






Zone 2 starts north of the petrol pump (Pine Mansion) to Reay Road, it comprises Dockyard, P D'Mello road area, Nawab tank, Dockyard Market, Copper Street. The zone is represented by Nelly Rodrigues, Vilbert D'Souza, and Nicolau D'Souza.




Zone 3 Is the first zone west of the dividing line, it comprises of the areas of Nawab Nagar, and Belvedere Road including St. Peter's School, Yash Apartments, Rosary House, Kishant Apartment, and Suryakund. It is represented by Claire Figueiredo, Alita Braganza, and Alphonso Fernandes. Figueiredo on account of advanced age has opted out and Sophie has taken her place.





Zone 4 Starts from Miranda House and includes Lion's Den, Gunpowder Road, Tulsi Wadi, Mazagaon Towers, Sheetal Apartments, and Tambawalla Building. It is animated by Irene Nazareth, Shirley Castellino, and Valentine D'Souza.




Zone 5 comprises the Matharpakady Village, Monarch Apartments, Netra Apartments, Porbandar Apartments, and Hira Apartments and is represented by Jocelyn Pereira, Selma Pulical, and Mellicent Baptista.

The sacred heart of Jesus is a feast that is intrinsically tied into the ethos of the Archdiocese of Bombay. Practically every house in the Archdiocese and in our Parish has an image of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary on the Altar. Most families have consecrated themselves to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Hence, it is no surprise that there is a great devotion to the Sacred Heart, and it is fitting that there should be a Triduum to bring in the feast. This year it began on the feast of St. Anthony, the 13th of June, and the theme focused on was "Finding Peace in the Heart of Christ."

Each Human being encounters moments and situations that fill them with fear and uncertainty. Through the reflection of that day, we are called to overcome fear by trusting in Jesus Christ and allowing Christ's peace to take root in our hearts. This is done by rooting our lives in dependence on God and approaching God in prayer.

On June 14, Wednesday, our theme was "Finding Mercy in the Heart of Christ"

In the image of the Sacred Heart, we encounter a merciful Jesus, and are reminded that His love and grace are accessible to all, regardless of their background or circumstances. It is a powerful reminder that in times of uncertainty and doubt, we can find solace and strength by placing our trust in Him.

On Thursday, June 15th, we reflected on "Finding Hope in the Heart of Christ." Without hope, we can literally become sick. Heartsick. Sick in our minds and souls. So then, how do we find hope? Where do we look for it? How do we gain it? How do we fill our hearts and minds with the hope of Christ? We may know in our heads that Christ alone is our source of hope. But how do we get our hearts to believe it, too? The answer is simple: hope takes practice. Hope takes faith. Hope takes work. Hope must be an active word in our vocabulary. Hope is not passive. Hope doesn't arrive on our doorstep. Hope must be invited in and practiced.

On the feast day, we reflected on the **Heart of Jesus: His Sacred Heart.**

What does the heart of Jesus invite us to do? Only one thing: To listen to the beating of that heart. To listen to that heart and, like the beloved disciple at the first Eucharist, lean our heads and ears on the chest of the Lord and then listen to the beating of that heart. That is intimacy, and our first invitation from the Lord, "Come to me with your ears close to my chest and listen to the beating of my heart."

Matharpacady Village Cross Feast

On Monday evening, 1st May 2023, around 300 residents and friends assembled around the decorated stage and altar near the Holy Cross Oratory, to devoutly participate in praise, song, and worship at the Feast Mass. The Managing Committee organized the 148th Thanksgiving Novena Services and Feast Mass Celebrations. This tradition has been handed down by our forefathers down the decades for well over a century to protect the resident families from the scourge of plague and pestilence.

THE LAST DEVOTEES: CELEBRATING ST. ANTHONY'S FEAST IN TAMBAWALA BUILDING

t is not unusual to see common altars adorning the dark and dingy corridors of old buildings in Mazagaon. They are a testament to the times when these buildings and corridors were bustling with Catholics. They hold the memories of a bygone era, where laughter, music, dances, prayers, and faith echoed through these walls. As many residents started leaving Mazagaon and chose to settle in the suburbs, abroad, or in Goa, the laughter and music faded; leaving them only as nostalgic memories in the hearts of the few remaining residents.

You will find one such altar on the first floor of the Tambawala building. Holding a lily in the right hand and propping up a book as well as the child Jesus in the other, St Anthony tenderly looks down, through the glass of the carved wooden altar. He is highly revered by the residents, who celebrate his feast every year on the 13th of June.



Effie Braganza, now the lone catholic resident on the first floor reminisces the bygone days when the feast was a big affair. "Since I came here in the 1980s, the novena and feast was always something all residents looked forward to. On the feast day the litany would be sung, accompanied by the music of a brass band that would be specially called from Dhobitalao for the occasion. Thereafter, dances took place in the corridor, with partying and merry-making lasting throughout the night." While they still celebrate the feast, it is kept low profile. "Earlier we even used to recite the rosary every day at the altar, but as people started moving

out, that stopped. Then we used to have only the novena and the feast. Now for the past few years, we have not had the novena also because there are no people, and the few that still live here go to Goa at that time. But I pushed for having the feast. Sometimes I call another neighbour who now resides in Byculla and we both conduct the prayers."

Anthony Caido, a septuagenarian, who only comes to live in the building occasionally recalls the peculiar story behind the statue. "Earlier there used to be a small, broken statue of St. Anthony. Out of the eighteen houses on the first floor, sixteen of them had catholic residents. One time when they were collecting money for the St Anthony fund, one particular resident refused to contribute, citing that he did not live there for most of the months. Soon after that, he made a trip to Poona. There, his legs got caught up and he was unable to move. He felt that this must have happened because he did not contribute to the fund, and on returning bought a bigger statue of St Anthony



to replace the previous broken one. All the other residents were surprised as to why he bought this statue, and he narrated the incident to them. Another neighbour named Peter D'Souza did up the altar and that's how this statue is with us today."

The sense of reverence and devotion to St Anthony is not limited to the Catholics of the building. The non-Catholics join in too. "There was this Hindu Brahmin who was one of the two non-catholic residents on that floor. He was without a child for many years. One fellow told him to join us when we say the rosary and pray to St. Anthony. After that, he was blessed with a son. Even later on, when we prayed the rosary at the altar he used to come and stand with us." Mr. Caido and Effie recall.

"The other non-Catholics are very cooperative, too. Earlier they used to put garlands and light candles. They still come when invited."

BUT WHY AM I SO FAVORED, THAT THE MOTHER OF MY LORD SHOULD COME TO ME? (LK 1:43)

Come June and a heavenly visitor makes her way through the houses of the Catholic residents of D'Lima Street. Held by the head of the family, flanked by two candle bearers on either side and followed by a small procession of people harmonizing to the tune of *Pav Maie* and O Come to the Throne of Grace, the statue of Our Lady of Fatima is taken from one house to the next, where the previous day itself, all preparations are made to ensure that the house is spic and

span. She is welcomed at the doorstep by the matriarch of the house with a garland and dhuri (incensing) - one of the pre-conversion Hindu welcoming traditions we still follow. Thereafter, she is placed on a table meticulously wrapped in white cloth, and the prayers commence. Many families still prefer to conduct them in Konkani. "Eh dullobi ani mogall Maie, ailo amkam bhagiancho vell, polleunk Tuka amchea gharant ani mandunk Tuka amche familintli koxi, le, bore baxen!" (O Merciful and Loving Mother, the time has come, for this holy moment, to see you in our house and honour you as one of our family: We warmly welcome you!) These words are sure to move the heart of our Blessed Mother, and the members of the family, too, for on the next day, when it's time for her to go to the next house, they tearfully bid her adieu to the tune of Adeus, adeus Maie.

The tradition of taking Our Lady or Saibinn from house to house is thought to have started in Goa around 1952 when a statue of Our Lady of Fatima was brought from Portugal to Old Goa. The Goans probably brought this ritual with them to Bombay, where they came and settled





in large numbers, in areas like D'Lima Street. This tradition was then taken up by the other Catholics of the area as well.

"From childhood, we would be very excited whenever Mother Mary would come to our house. One of my favourite memory is when our house was full of neighbours and we all prayed the Rosary together" says Melvita, a resident of D'Lima Street. Kaitlyn, another resident recounts what goes into preparing for the ritual: "We clean our houses, buy flowers, candles and a garland, prepare an altar, prepare channa, sweets, and snacks to be distributed, and invite friends and family over." "On the day when Our Lady stays with us, we recite the rosary thrice and sing hymns to Her. We pray for all our intentions, confident that She will intercede for us." Joe D'Cruz recalls his childhood days when the Konkani Mens Sodality would come around, giving everyone slips with the date of Our Lady's visit to their house. "People would ask Our Lady for special favours, promising her that if their favours were fulfilled, they would keep Her in their house for two days instead of one! There were so many Catholics at that time that in each building Our Lady would remain for around 25-30 days - Coronation Building, Hamid Building, Bob's Bungalow, Bachuwali Building, Mohammad Bhai Mansion...and after one building was over the members of the Men's Sodality would come and empty the offering box and deposit the money in church. The litany was always sung in Latin and overall it was a festive affair. There would be a huge crowd and we would give sweets and channas to everyone."

Through the years, this time-honored ritual of taking Our Lady of Fatima from house to house has not only strengthened the community's faith, but has also promoted harmony, forgiveness, and good relationships among neighbours- the good relationships are maintained and cultivated over the conversations had while snacking on boiled gram!


