editorial

Embracing The New Year With GRAMS: A Guide To Spiritual Renewal

Dear Friends in Christ Jesus,

As we step into the embrace of a new year, it is natural for us to harbour questions about what lies ahead. The lyrics of the famous song "Que sera, sera" comes to mind – whatever will be, will be; the future is not ours to see. Indeed, what will the new year bring? Will it be a year of blessings and graces? We may never know, but God does. In Jeremiah 29:11, the Lord declares, "I know the plans I have for you, plans for good and not for harm, to give you a future and a hope."

In light of this divine assurance, let us make a fervent plea to surrender the helm of our lives to God. Let Him be the pilot, for He alone knows the intricate plans He has crafted for each of us. Do not attempt to be the co-pilot or a back-seat driver; let God take charge and chart the course of your life. As Jeremiah promises, in relinquishing control to Him, we can find hope and a good future.

The first step toward a truly happy new year is to give God control, but it doesn't end there. We must also be vigilant in recognizing the opportunities God provides. In 1 Corinthians 16:9, Paul speaks of a wide door for effective work opening amidst adversaries. Additionally, asking the right questions is crucial for making the new year truly new. Ephesians 4:22-24 guides us in understanding the need to put off the old and put on the new. This process involves shedding old habits, thoughts, and actions, replacing them with the newness found in Christ. Continuously ask, "What do I need to put off, and what do I need to put on?"

Making room for the new is another vital step, as emphasized in Leviticus 26:10. By loving God with all our heart, soul, and mind, and loving our neighbours as ourselves (Matthew 22:37-39), we create space for new blessings, a new life, and new grace. Love is the key that unlocks the door to transformation.

Finally, setting right our priorities is essential for a meaningful new year. Jesus, in Matthew 6:25 and 33, reminds us not to worry about the seemingly important things but to seek first His kingdom and righteousness. By discerning between what seems important and what is truly important, we align ourselves with God's priorities.

As we embark on this new year, let us recall and embrace these points through the acronym GRAMS:

G: Giving God Control

R: Recognizing the Opportunities

A: Asking the Right Questions

M: Making Room for the New

S: Setting Right Our Priorities

May the new year be filled with God's grace and blessings as we journey together in faith. Have a joyous and spiritually fulfilling New Year!

WORLD DAY OF THE POOR

18-19 Nov | The Food Project

"World Day of the Poor" established by Pope Francis, is observed on the 33rd Sunday in ordinary time. The theme of this year, the Seventh World Day of the Poor, 2023: "Do not turn your face away from anyone who is poor" (Tob 4:7)

As part of our Social Outreach Programme, Fr. Nigel, along with the Parish Council decided that we should provide meals to the poor on this day. Few of us along with Father visited Tata Hospital a couple of times to have an idea about the conditions of the people living there on the streets. Here we have countless people, mainly patients, who have come for free cancer treatment and living on the footpaths in not so good conditions, since they cannot afford accommodation in Mumbai. We decided that we would provide a meal for these people along with some useful provisions.

This programme was spear headed by the organizing committee from the Parish Council who meticulously planned every detail, right from the purchasing items for the Kitchdi, hiring the cooks, and distributing the meals. 70 volunteers, came together on the 18th to help with the cleaning, washing and chopping of the vegetables, folding of towels and doing all the pre-preparations for the meals, not to forget their colourful aprons. There was a deep sense of purpose among all our volunteers, all so eagerly wanting to not only do the task they were assigned for, but also to help in many other ways that they could.

19th Nov, again saw many volunteers who came forward to help with the chopping of onions, tomatoes, corriander and also helping the cooks to prepare the meals by stirring and boiling the eggs. Finally, the dal Kitchdi was ready with its lovely aroma all over the place. Our enthusiastic volunteers with their cooking caps, helped in packing around 600 food packets. These were loaded in three vehicles along with the bananas, eggs, chaas and towels.

After a short prayer, led by Fr. Merwyn, around twenty volunteers left for Parel, to help with the distribution. On reaching the site, we divided ourself into two groups and distributed the food along with the other provisions.

Although this entire process was a long one, it was nothing compared to the enriching experience that we all had. We all returned back with our hearts full of love and compassion.






CHRIST THE KING

The evening extended with a procession from neighboring parishes, culminating at St. Joseph's for a joint prayer service.






3 Dec | Talk Organized By The Bombay Catholic Sabha










Nov | Rosaries In Zone 1


Dec 1982, Belvedere Road star 2nd prize (ht: 35 ft)

Christmas At Rear Helal Building

The children and youth of Rear Helal Building have always been very active and creative especially around the joyous time of Christmas. The excitement always began with making of the star for the lane . Residents of all faiths of the building and the neighbouring buildings would come together and work all through the night on the Rear Helal terrace to make the star. The putting up of the star in the lane was like a grand ceremony with everyone waiting for the star to be put up and the light to come on. The cheers and the excitement that followed is something that we all look forward to even till today. 22nd night was the night to decorate the verandahs with buntings and stars outside everyones houses. There was also a tradition of all children getting buckets of soap water and cloth to wash the outside walls and window panes of their houses so that the decorations and stars outside each house would glow against the clean white walls. Come Christmas day, after mass everyone would go around the building wishing each other, checking out the decor in everyone's house, admiring the christmas trees and the cribs and of course taking a bite of all the delicacies served. Kids went along with handkerchiefs house to house to collect all the marzipans, milk toffee, kulkuls, etc. Christmas evening was party time with all the kids and family out on the terrace having fun playing games, talent displays of singing and dancing, snacks and drinks, singing carols, dancing with Santa and grabbing at the sweets he threw up in the air from his heavy bag. After all the fun and games was the highlight of the evening, the much awaited gift ceremony with Santa Claus, where we used to wait patiently for our names to get called out to go and collect our gifts from Santa. The goodie bags for the kids was always a big heavy one thanks to all the generous sponsors.





The week after Christmas was always busy with making of the old man. All the kids would be scurrying around searching for hay, collecting old clothes, the most famous being the Mazagaon dock boiler jumpsuits. Back stitch, tacks, button hole stitch, all of us had our first sewing lessons practicing on the old man clothes. The tough part came in when the old men were ready, all the kids had to keep an eye for the so called "old man robbers" who would whisk away the old men lying on the terrace. The kids wouldn't rest till they found them all again. New years eve party was another event which all of us waited for. I don't think any of us went for any new year dances as we had much more fun on the terrace. Discovering time as ultimate healer

After 7 surgeries and long recovery period, Ransley now leads a 'normal' life

EIGHT YEARS after the gruesome terror attack that claimed 166 lives and left around 300 others injured, 36-year-old Ransley Santhumayor vividly remembers looking directly into the eyes of one of the terrorists and the AK-47 gun he trained on him at Cafe Leopold in Colaba seconds before he shot him in the leg. After several surgeries and a long recovery period, Santhumayor now leads a 'normal' life and embracing a positive attitude helped him cope with the long-lasting consequences of that fateful night.

Recounting his ordeal, Santhumayor said he, accompanied by a friend, had dropped in at Cafe Leopold on November 26 to grab a quick bite and a beer. "Usually, we would sit upstairs where the music would be playing. But unfortunately on that day we were in a hurry and decided to sit downstairs instead. Just minutes after we had placed our order, we heard a blast and we immediately hid behind the table. We thought perhaps a gangwar had broken out or perhaps a lunatic was firing shots. It never crossed our minds that it could be a terror attack," he said.

After the firing had ceased, Santhumayor tried to get up when one of the terrorists spotted him, "Our eyes locked for a brief second and I gotthe feeling an animal would get staring into the headlights of an oncoming

vehicle. He shot me in the leg and I could see that the bone was completely shattered. In that moment, I really thought I was going to die," he said.

The bullet went through the bone in his right leg and there was a considerable risk of losing the leg altogether. Amid the hazy details, the mind-numbing pain and the fear of not being able to walk again, Santhumayor recounted the worst part of the entire ordeal to be the poor quality of emergency medical services in the country. "My friend had to take me in a taxi to St George Hospital since there were no ambulances. The staff's behaviour towards the patients was horrible and I remember the doctor there had wanted to amputate my leg," he said. Owing to a shortage of supplies, Santhumayor added, he was moved from a stretcher to a wheelchair to a stool and eventually made to lie on the floor. "I was bleeding and bone fragments were jutting out when this guy came to wrap my leg with some cardboard.

Thankfully, my parents arrived shortly after and shifted me to the Bombay Hospital. I remember the sense of immense relief when I gained consciousness and found my leg still attached to me," he said.

As homifying as the attack was, the long duration Santhumayor had to spend in a hospital confined to a bed proved to be a bigchallenge for him. Santhumayor attributed his speedy recovery to the continuous support from his parents and his former employer, the Tata Teleservices. "Myemployers were extremely considerate and understanding, Ratan Tata came to visit me in the hospital and asked me to take all the time I needed. I. however, hated spending so much time in the hospital and I was back at work six months after the incident," he said.

Apart from the physical recovery, the ordeal left him nervous about crowded places out of fear of such an incident recurring again. "I remember I was petrified the first time I went back to Cafe Leopold with my family for lunch a year after the incident. For a brief time period, my loyalties had shifted from Cafe Leopold to Cafe Mondegar. But I was able to overcome my fears without any counselling, though it took me almost three years to be able to completely let go of the stress," he said.

While the continuous supportofhis employers, his family and friends was the driving force that helped Santhumayor make a remarkable physical recovery after seven surgeries, the words of an American woman who had been shot in both her legs motivated him immensely to look beyond the incident. "Despite the blurriness caused by the painkillers, I distinctly remember her words, which helped me understand that it is important not to get entangled in the question 'Why me?'. If I can get over a situation as difficult as this. I can face any challenge life throws at me hereon," he said.

Currently working as a senior manager with the business services department Vodafone, Santhumayor is now married and has a one-year-old son Adam. Even after his recovery, his right leg is about an inch shorter than the left and there is a significant portion of scar tissue left behind from the seven surgeries on his leg. And his injury has left him with a slight limp. Determined to not let the ordeal limit his life in any manner, he said, "Nothing ever prepares you for something like this. Today, I can say that we are over it. But there are people who have suffered worse injuries than mine and for some the damage has been irreversible. I, however, believe that time and a positive attitude can help heal the worst of injuries," he said before he hopped on to his bicycle and rodeaway.

Behind-The-Scenes of the Shadow Play Production

The sixth of October will be remembered for a long time in our Parish. It is the day so many of our parishioners came together to put up a heart-touching performance. "A Gift from the Queen" was a shadow play that narrated the profound and sacred story of the Rosary. This grand production, executed completely by the parishioners, was an attempt to deepen the understanding of the Rosary's significance, portraying it not just as a prayer but as a divine gift from the Queen of Heaven to her devoted children. Here's a glimpse into the behind-the-scenes journey of how this production unfolded.

Week 1: Setting the Stage

Our journey began with the finalization of the script in September. Week 1 was dedicated to sculpting the narrative—fine-tuning, cutting excess, and adding dialogues to ensure engagement. Meanwhile, casting forms were dispatched, assembling a group of individuals enthusiastic about participating. In addition to assembling our cast, we worked on creating a preliminary draft that paired voices with shadows. This involved identifying actors whose voices suited particular roles and shadows that best represented the required characters. To further enhance our understanding, we delved into the technical aspects, experimenting with a cloth and light to grasp the intricacies of shadow dynamics. This helped ensure that each shadow cast would deliver the desired visual impact on stage.

Week 2: Casting and Briefing

After reaching out to potential actors and voice artists and confirming their commitment, we officially kicked off our journey. The initial meeting was a crucial milestone, where we gathered our cast and briefed them on the entire story. This session provided a comprehensive understanding of their roles and set expectations for the upcoming weeks of intense practices. During this week, we also initiated the training of our voice artists. The goal was to immerse them in their characters, enabling them to feel the emotions behind the words and effectively convey them to the audience. In addition to voice training, we commenced practices without shadows. This approach provided a clearer understanding of the required actions for the actors, allowing them to familiarize themselves with the movements and gestures essential for their roles.






Week 3: Studio Recording and Audio Integration

In the third week, we had the voice artists come to the studio, where we recorded all voice artists using professional equipment. We recorded the smallest details too such as crowd murmurs and the chilling screams of children witnessing hell. The music was then integrated into this audio track. This week, our comprehensive audio track, a culmination of voices, sounds, and music, became the guiding force during rehearsals, allowing performers to synchronize with cues from either the music, narration, or dialogues. For instance, we had a soldier scene where all they had to do was march in and out, hence the reliance on music cues became particularly crucial for precise coordination. The production required manpower, although there were scenes as small as involving crowds walking in and out. While it might seem trivial to play such a small role, witnessing the grand picture of the entire play coming together highlighted the importance of even these seemingly minor contributions. To ensure efficient use of everyone's time, acts were carefully scheduled, with only specific scenes rehearsed on designated days.

Week 4: Apparitions and Costume Designing

As we entered the fourth week, the spotlight shifted to the visual elements that would bring historical richness to our shadow play. We were involved in capturing the ethereal essence of the apparitions. The apparition scenes were shot separately and then integrated into the main audio and video track. This allowed us to create a reverse image, with the screen now in black and shadows in white, enhancing the visual impact and providing a celestial quality to Mary's presence. We also worked on the integration of backgrounds for the scenes. These backgrounds played a pivotal role in transporting our audience to different time periods, adding layers of authenticity and context to our narrative. The meticulous selection of backgrounds was essential to ensure a seamless blend with the diverse timelines depicted in our play. Simultaneously, the costume team worked diligently to design outfits that accurately represented the distinct fashion of each time period. This process demanded extensive research to maintain authenticity and immerse the audience in the historical context. Additionally, props were crafted to complement the scenes, contributing to the overall depth of our historical narrative.











Week 5: Putting it all Together

This week, full-length rehearsals began, allowing us to fine-tune each act and ensure a smooth synchronization with the audio cues. This marked a crucial stage where the various components of our shadow play started coming together in harmony. In addition to full-length rehearsals, we conducted dress rehearsals that included props and costumes. This practical session aimed to understand the logistical aspects of our performance better. For instance, in the war scene, not only were the actors involved, but the backstage crew also played a crucial role in firing gunshots at each other and simulating collapses, all while ensuring everyone's safety. Two days before the main event, the actual screen was set up, and a run-through with the video track took place for the first time. This allowed the entire team, including the backstage crew, to understand the timing required for shifting props during the blank screens. The planning, dedication of our cast and crew, technical exploration, and guidance from our priests have come together to create a production that will go down in the history of Our Lady of the Rosary Church.





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Now, let's hear from the key figures behind this remarkable production. Here's an inside look into their experiences, challenges faced, and the creative process that brought "A Gift from the Queen" to life.

Daniel Dias, Scriptwriter and Artistic Director:

What inspired you to choose the topic of the Rosary for the shadow play? How did the initial idea take shape?

"Having heard fragments of stories about the Rosary, from the apparitions to the feast of Our Lady, I realized the lack of a cohesive narrative. I knew about the different apparitions of Our Lady, about St. Dominic being given the rosary by Mary, but these narratives existed in bits and pieces. The idea took shape when I recognized the need for a sequential portrayal. With the approaching Rosary feast, I felt compelled to weave these narratives into a logical sequence, presenting them in a way that deeply resonates with the audience.

I'm not exaggerating when I say that I have genuinely witnessed the Rosary manifest miracles in my life. Crafting this narrative was an emotionally stirring experience, and there were moments when I found myself profoundly moved, occasionally pausing to reflect and contemplate the profound impact of these miraculous events. My sincere hope is that the audience was able to- at least in some way-experience what I experienced.

You served as the scriptwriter as well. Can you share insights into the storytelling choices, and how you approached depicting complex narratives through shadows?

As the scriptwriter and artistic director, I aimed to make the play visually gripping and emotionally touching, turning the history of the Rosary into a captivating experience. The challenge involved condensing multiple stories into one cohesive timeline and deciding what to keep or cut. To keep things engaging, I added dialogues, steering away from monotony. Additionally, the music and visuals had to match the scenes and evoke the required emotions, along with ensuring that every background picture matched seamlessly with the given time frame.

Alicia Dias, Director

As the director of the shadow play, what unique challenges did you face in bringing the script to life through visual storytelling?

"Directing the voice was one of the most captivating aspects for me. I've always been intrigued by the power of the voice and the flexibility required as a voice artist. Often, we downplay the role of the voice, failing to recognize that it, combined with music, breathes life into a performance. Narrating a line isn't just about saying it; you have to feel the essence, immerse yourself in the character, in order to evoke the intended emotions in your audience. The historical scenes from past centuries demanded more than just a contemporary interpretation; they required a journey back in time. For instance, directing the Battle of Lepanto, which presented a unique challenge. Initially assuming they could simply keep shooting, I was struck with the realization that there were no rifle guns back then. To authentically recreate the scene, I had to transport myself to that era, to ensure historical accuracy. When it came to figures instrumental in perpetuating the rosary, such as St. Dominic and Blessed Alan, where no cinematic references existed, I had to rely on my own creativity. Even when directing the apparitions and guiding the kids to react as if they were truly seeing Mary during every practice, was a beautiful experience.

Moreover, a shadow play is different from a normal play. It poses a challenge because in a traditional play, you can still look at facial expressions and subtle gestures. In a shadow play, everything has to be exaggerated, and through your body language alone, you have to convey your message. Besides conveying messages solely through body language, in a shadow play, you're heavily relying on actions. I remember in our first practice, the actors were trying to act out every single word, and from their perspective, it makes sense. But when viewed from an audience perspective, it's distracting and takes away the main message trying to be conveyed. All of that had to be kept in mind. So, it was quite a unique experience, and I thoroughly enjoyed the creative process.

Devotion to Mary has always been a personal inspiration. While many of us are taught to have a relationship with Jesus, I believe we often overlook the significance of cultivating a connection with Mary. I've witnessed firsthand the transformative power of Marian devotion in my life and the lives of those around me. If there's one thing I hope the audience took away from this, it's the invitation to develop a relationship with Mary. She hears, understands, and will always lead you to her son, Jesus."



Clarissa Alphonso, Production Coordinator

Managing the production must have been an intricate task. How did you coordinate the technical aspects, props, and actors to create a seamless performance?

We were accustomed to school plays and college performances, but this venture was an entirely different experience. Coordinating the production was indeed a challenge, but it was a task I thoroughly enjoyed. Our director and producer provided clear guidance, knowing exactly what they wanted, yet remaining open to changes, fostering a collaborative team effort. Managing 50 actors, ensuring costumes and props, dealing with dropouts—all required strategic planning. Some actors dropped off, but with a personal touch, I managed to have some play double or triple roles. The artistic director's work, turning shadows into color, was truly remarkable. To ensure efficient time management for actors, I meticulously planned scenes, calling in specific actors for particular scenes on designated days. This strategic approach was essential for the smooth execution of the production. Teamwork was the key, and everyone proactively contributed to making it a success.

Shanti Monteiro, Head of the Costume Team


Recreating historical costumes must have been a fascinating task. How did you approach the challenge of dressing characters from different time periods?
